9-11 unsullied

At the four-year anniversary of September 11, five Hollywood movies; including one by Oliver Stone; are in the works, dramatizing the terrorist attacks. But one Maryland-based filmmaker is adamant that the pivotal event remain in perspective. "I'm tired of victimhood and hand-wringing over September 11th," said Russ Hodge, whose attitude is reflected in "For the Love of Their Brother," a straightforward account of one New York family who memorialized the death of their brother at the World Trade Center by organizing a public charity run. It retraces the route firefighter and father of five Stephen Siller took when he ran back into the city laden with 75 pounds of equipment; after the towers were attacked. He had just returned home to Staten Island from his shift. The fourth annual "Tunnel to Towers" run takes place Sept. 25. It will be attended by, among others, former New York Mayor Rudolph W. Guiliani and Sen. Charles E. Schumer, New York Democrat. The 30-minute program will air nationwide on public television stations, including WHUT in the Washington, this Sunday.
